## **Harry Barlow**

W. [Harry] Barlow was born on 24 December 1886. Harry's father and mother, Mr J. and Mrs C. Barlow, lived in Radcliffe, Manchester, England. Harry was a miner at Wakamarina and he worked for Humphries Brothers, in Havelock in 1914. Harry had a sister living in the South Island, New Zealand.

His army serial number was 6/194 and he was ranked as a private when he enlisted in the New Zealand Expeditionary Force on 17 August 1914. He gave his religion as a Methodist. He embarked on 16 October 1914 with the 12<sup>th</sup> (Nelson) Company in the Canterbury Infantry Battalion, NZEF.<sup>3</sup>

He was sent to the Balkan theatre of war and saw action at Gallipoli in the Dardanelles campaign in 1915.<sup>4</sup> At Quinn's Post, on Walker's Ridge above Anzac Cove on 21-22 June 1915, he distinguished himself. He crawled from his trench, without orders, to reconnoiter a Turkish shelter. He bombed it and returned with two Turkish bombs in hand.<sup>5</sup>

At the advance on Chunuk Bair on 7 August 1915 he was suffered a wound from an enemy bomb attack, which caused blindness in his right eye. <sup>6</sup> He contracted influenza two weeks later and was invalided to England in September. <sup>7</sup> He spent time with his family in Manchester while recovering then he returned to New Zealand on the troopship 'Rotorua' in December 1915. <sup>8</sup> He was discharged from the NZEF on 16 March 1916. <sup>9</sup>

He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for his actions, by the Mayor, on the Church steps in Nelson on 27 June 1916.<sup>10</sup>

His further medals were the 1914-1915 Star, the British War Medal, and the Victory Medal.

He attested again in the armed forces, 9 October 1919 and the medical report mentions his disability of blindness in the left eye. He finally left the army being discharged on 27 July 1920.<sup>11</sup> He resided then at Hastings Street, Christchurch and he died at Christchurch on 8 July 1954.<sup>12</sup>
